Content Versus Writing Questions

The purpose of this handout is to help to identify the difference between content and writing issues. You are responsible for both the content of your paper and the quality of the writing. Content goals are to understand the methods or findings of a paper, identify and understand the relevant literature, and determine the key messages. Writing goals are to organize the content, convey key messages in a coherent story, and use well-built paragraphs and sentences and well-chosen words. Content questions are best directed to course leaders, while writing questions may be best directed to Writing Center tutors. Tutors can also help you determine where to direct your questions.

What Questions Can Tutors at the Psychology Writing Center Answer?

The Psychology Writing Center helps students to use writing to reflect their thinking in the field of psychology. Writing tutors do not do these things: select articles, determine the main points of your paper, provide your thesis statement, develop your hypotheses, or interpret your statistical output. You should generate these ideas. Writing Center tutors do play a supporting role in helping you to refine your ideas. We also do not proofread papers for spelling and grammar issues unless the paper is a final version and needs no other writing help (this is rare).
